## **Moira's Scrub Hub**

Moira has set up the Hazelwood Scrub Hub on hearing from Diane, a physio friend, who works at Mount Alvernia Hospital in Guildford where the physios were due to start working alongside nurses in the Coronavirus ward this week. They needed easy-care medical scrubs and Moira followed the example of other volunteer groups by downloading and grading up paper patterns, purchasing rolls of blue polycotton fabric and setting up a mini group comprising her, her neighbour Sharron and their friend Shirley, plus Diane who came over on a couple of occasions to help cut out the fabric and take back the completed sets to the hospital. Between them, they've delivered twenty-three sets of scrubs, one for each physio, and will now start making extras for them all. They've had some lovely messages of thanks from the physios.

## **Something Helen Sasia found and is calling all crocheters and knitters to join!**

Looking for volunteers to knit, crochet or sew some little hearts for our *Hearts for our Hospital* cause. They will touch so many families in their time of grief. As you are aware, the patients that pass away in hospitals are not allowed their family with them and so the staff at the hospital can put a little heart with their loved one as they sadly pass away and then a duplicate heart will be sent out to the families. Our hearts will originally be taken to North Middlesex Hospital, but we will reach out to others. The hearts should be approximately 6.5cm long so that they can fit into a hand and all colours are acceptable as long as they are in matching pairs but pink or red are preferable. We are just waiting on some clarification from the infection control team about how they would like the hearts packaged. We will also arrange a place for the hearts to be dropped off at. # To the children from Bishop Sarah



Dear children,

I write a lot of letters. I write to vicars, to other bishops, in fact to all kinds of grown-ups but I also wanted to write to you as you are an important part of our churches and I am your Bishop too.

This is a funny time to be writing to you, in the middle of a time when we are all staying at home and London has changed so much. I live in the very middle of London and when I walk my dog it's odd to see St Paul's Cathedral with no one sat on the steps, and Bracken is missing the chance to try and steal the food they leave behind! I wonder how your life has changed? I'm sure you miss being able to play outside and see your friends in real life, not just on a screen.



I'm sure you are finding it a little frightening as well; I know I am, and it's ok to be frightened sometimes. It's nearly Easter time and I can't help but think about how suddenly life changed for Jesus' friends in that one week. On Palm Sunday Jesus was welcomed into Jerusalem as a hero to cheers and His friends must have thought everything was going amazingly well but by Friday Jesus was dead and they were hiding away and frightened.

Suddenly everything had changed. Of course, we know the end of the story and that on Easter Sunday some brave women went to care for Jesus' body and were the first to see that Jesus was alive. Soon all of Jesus' friends discovered something new; Jesus was always with them wherever they were.

This did not mean that Jesus' friends stopped being scared or that frightening things stopped happening to them, but they did find knowing that Jesus was always with them meant they could keep going and do some amazing things. I hope that through this time knowing Jesus is with us too would help us to keep going and help us do some amazing things, even if amazing might mean not winding up your brother or remembering to clear away your bowl!

One thing we can all do is pray. Before I was a bishop I was a nurse and understand how hard our doctors and nurses are working and I hope you will join me in praying for them. We can pray that God will help them, that God will give them the wisdom to know what to do and that God will protect them.

Finally, I want you to know that I am praying for you, I'm praying that God will be with you through this time. Every morning I go to a special place in my house where I pray, and I think of you then as I pray for all the children and young people in our churches and schools. If you ask your parent to email me just your first name, I will add it to my prayers by putting your name in a pot I keep in that room.

I look forward to seeing you in our churches when this time is over.

# Recipes

## Brilliant Banana Loaf

recommended  
by Gemma  
Thompson

Baking  
with  
Love

### Ingredients

140g butter, softened, plus extra for the tin

140g caster sugar

2 large eggs, beaten

140g self-raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

2 very ripe bananas, mashed

50g icing sugar

handful dried banana chips, for decoration

### Method

1. Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4.
2. Butter a 2lb loaf tin and line the base and sides with baking parchment.
3. Cream 140g softened butter and 140g caster sugar until light and fluffy, then slowly add 2 beaten large eggs with a little of the 140g flour.
4. Fold in the remaining flour, 1 tsp baking powder and 2 mashed bananas.
5. Pour into the tin and bake for about 30 mins until a skewer comes out clean.
6. Cool in the tin for 10 mins, then remove to a wire rack.
7. Mix 50g icing sugar with 2-3 tsp water to make a runny icing.
8. Drizzle the icing across the top of the cake and decorate with a handful of banana chips.

## CHEESE PUDDING

Cooking time: 30 minutes    Quantity: 4 helpings

$\frac{1}{2}$  pint milk or household milk  
2 eggs (2 level tablespoons  
dried egg mixed with 4  
tablespoons water)

4 oz grated cheese  
1 breakfastcup breadcrumbs  
salt and pepper  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  teaspoon dry mustard

**METHOD:** Add the milk to the egg mixture and stir in the other ingredients. Pour into a greased dish and bake for about 30 minutes in a moderately hot oven till brown and set.

## **North Middlesex Hospital is calling all Sewers: Create and donate uniform wash bags for our staff**

If you, or someone you know, is experienced on a sewing machine or can craft with just a needle and thread, we need your help and creative skills to make and donate simple uniform wash bags for our staff.

To avoid cross-contamination, a fabric wash bag will allow staff treating COVID-19 patients to safely store, transport and wash their scrubs once they get home following their shift at work. Ideally, bags should measure 15' x 20' and made of a fabric suitable for a 60C heat wash.





We would love contributions of the following:


- prayers




